What is Call-Em-All?

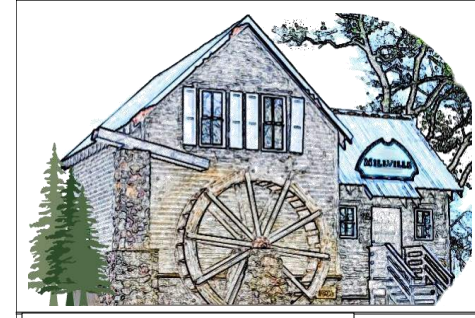

The first Millville Farmers Market in 2012 was extremely successful, thanks to the patrons who shopped weekly, the 13 vendors, and the volunteers and town employees. The total produce sales were \$15,015.05 and everything else was \$11,498.50.

Our 2013 market is shaping up to add variety for all ages. Fiscal Facts

Welcome to all our new property owners, welcome back to our summer residents, and hello again to our year round residents! Thank you all for helping us achieve a tax payment rate of over 99%.

The new fiscal year started May 1, 2013 and runs through April 30, 2014. The current year's budget can be found on the Town's web site.

As a cost savings measure, our Town newsletter was enclosed with your annual property tax bill. Property taxes are due **July 31, 2013**; late charges will be assessed after that date. If your mortgage company is escrowing for your taxes, please forward the bill to them for payment. (Per the Town Charter, we must bill the property owner.) This will avoid duplicate payments and the need to process refunds. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

If your billing address has changed, please notify Town Hall in writing as soon as possible. Post Office forwarding addresses cover only a limited time frame.

If you had a commercial or residential rental license last fiscal year, the semi-annual gross rental receipts report for the period October 1, 2012 through April 30, 2013 is due on **June 1st**. If you have not already done so, please submit your report and any tax due as soon as possible. The gross rental receipts form was mailed along with your license renewal application and invoice. The 2013 MVG is 23 members strong and growing. We help out in Town Hall and at various events in surrounding communities. This year we will have volunteers working in the schools with the mentoring program and Read-a-Loud program; running a clinic for seniors on balance; working at the Ocean View Homecoming, County Library, Millville Farmers Market, Millville Pumpkin Festival and the new Holiday Market, patrolling the Town in the Neighborhood Watch Car, and working at Camp Barnes (see photo on back of newsletter). The goal for this year is to raise money for 60 new mattresses for Camp Barnes. WSFS Bank has already generously donated \$1000 towards the cause. We will have a jug at the farmers market for donations and in the fall the MVG will hold a dinner fund raiser for this cause as well. On April 20, 2013, the MVG helped with the Town wide clean up and worked with the State Police in cleaning up Camp Barnes for their upcoming new season.

For the past few years now, the volunteers have spent a great deal of time at Camp Barnes doing clean-up or repairs. During Special Olympics, we assist camp counselors by allowing them a chance to get much needed sleep after a long day. I was very surprised when I learned many people have no idea what Camp Barnes is all about. So let me share! BUILDING & CODE NOTES by Eric Evans

What a winter. I think we would still be shoveling if all that wet stuff was snow. That being said, I would like to remind everyone that the Town does have a grass and vegetation ordinance. Chapter 111 of the Town Code states: "No person, being the owner, or possessor or occupier of land or improved premises, shall permit upon such land or improved premises or any sidewalk abutting such land any unregulated growth of grass, weed or other vegetation to grow in excess of eight inches high." So I ask that while you and your neighbors continue to beautify your yards with flowers and landscaping, please do not forget to keep the other vegetation cut as well.

With all the construction going on here in Millville, please let me try and fill you in on the happenings. DelDOT is busy working on the alternate routes for their Route 26 (Atlantic Ave) project. The project is scheduled to start in the fall of 2013, however, you may notice utility work and tree removal work being performed at this time along the Route 26 corridor. I was informed that Windmill should be widened and paved by the end of May. This paving will help both the developments and builders in the area. Windhurst Manor is almost built out and Ryan Homes only has 3 buildings left before completion. Beazer Homes has started construction in the Bishops Landing Subdivision; they have 130 + lots available in Phase 1, plus an Amenity Center. Miller and Smith have started work in Millville by the Sea Phase 2 and the Amenity Center. Phase 2 has 50+ lots available. They are also working on 3 additional phases, which may have up to an additional 200 lots or so. Gulfstream Homes has continued to construct homes within the Coventry Subdivision and the development has opened up 10 additional lots around the pond area — this will give them about 25+ lots before they open up phase 2. The Meadows has seen activity after being dormant for some time and Insight Homes has completed 4 homes in this quaint little development, which only leaves about 10 or so lots available. All that being said, for your peace and tranquility, the Town does have construction hours in place. However, it does not cover infrastructure work. Construction hours for building homes are Monday through Friday, September 1 through May 15, 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., and May 16 through August 31, 7:30 a.m. - 7 p.m., and Saturdays all year long, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; no work should be performed on Sundays or Holidays except by the property owner.

PUTTING MILLVILLE ON THE MAP ... by Bob Linett

The last issue of the *Mill Wheel* provided a brief sketch of 1870's Millville, including listing the occupations of a subset of residents found in the 1870 census. Among those residents was 22-year-old Cyrus Holt, identified as a "sawyer, steam mill." That census also listed 23-year-old John Townsend as "engineer, steam mill." With the introduction of the Holt & Townsend steam mill, (which appears on the Beers Map of 1868) the Town experienced commercial growth and the infrastructure essential to success. 1876 tax records value the steam mill at \$1,500.

Thomas Scharf's *History of Delaware: 1609-1888* reports that E.C. Dukes established a post office at Millville in 1886. Shortly thereafter, in April 1887, the State (*Laws of Delaware*, Chapter 124, p. 188) authorized the consideration of a new public road to be built from Thomas Steel's landing on White's Creek "...to the school-house lot in Millville, and across said school-house lot to the public road leading from Ocean view to Frankford."

An 1887 map shows the broad contours of that road. (See the 1887 map at <http://millville.delaware.gov/files/2013/04/1887-Map-1.jpg> and <http://millville.delaware.gov/files/2013/04/1887-Map-2.jpg>). The school house appears in the lower left of the map, and stood where the Millville United Methodist Church is located today. Presumably, the road was used to transport timber and other products from the Holt and Townsend steam mill on County Road (now Atlantic Avenue) to the landing on the upper right hand corner of the map. The pictured intersecting road is Old Mill Road. Note that it crosses White's Creek at Derrikson's Millpond dam. That crossing remains today.

The 1888 tax records lists a steam mill owned by the Holt family at \$500. According to those same year's tax records, George Townsend purchased a steam mill from Peter Townsend valued at \$300.

In 1893, Cyrus Holt commented on the health of Millville's economy in the November 23 issue of *"The American Economist."* He wrote: *"The stagnation of the business world does not seem to affect us at this place as yet. There seems to be plenty of work. Labor is scarce and wages are as good as they were in 1892. Three of our steam mills stopped last week, but they started again to-day..."* Holt was apparently referring to the Panic of 1893, an economic depression caused by railroad overbuilding, shaky railroad financing, and bank failures.

Shipping also played a role in Millville's commercial growth. In 1894, the Department of Treasury's Bureau of Navigation published its "Annual List of Merchant Vessels." The Bureau listed the schooner "Emily Belle" out of Millville, Delaware.

An 1895 map (<http://millville.delaware.gov/files/2013/04/1895-US-Atlas-DE-Shows-Millville.jpg>) shows another road, now known as Dukes Drive, leading from what is now Windmill Road, through the lands of Steel, Furman, and Dukes to the Dukes Store, which also housed the post office. Tax records list George Townsend's steam mill in operation in 1896, closing in on the turn of the century.
